POW/MIA Vigil Durbin M. Keeney

As we quickly move into fall NVVA's Color Guard looks back to the parades and other events. Now we have up coming event that is one of our most important events that has been identified in the community as the NVVA's POW/MIA Vigil this September 15th. Over the years we have been able to have two repatriation ceremonies, many wonderful speakers to kick off the Vigil, great music, and a loyal following of people that attend. The Jr. Navy ROTC has joined us in the last few years and has taken many of the shifts at the bunker. They have joined the USAF ROTC Det. 420 that has covered the hours from 12 to 4 am. God Bless them as they make it possible for us to who are there for the duration to get a little shuteye.

We are so grateful to these wonderful young people. But to tell you the truth it is a small core group of our member that are there year after year that keeps this going. That frustrates many of us. We are a country at war and this event, this vigil, is more important than ever. Maybe some of our members have forgotten why we do this in the first place. We all know that our country has left thousands of American soldiers prisoners of war in the past. There were over 2,000 men left behind from our war alone. Slowly because of the constant prodding by Vietnam Veterans we have been able to bring closure for families about their sons, brothers, fathers, and husbands. Over the last two years we did that the Vigil. We seen first hand what it meant to the families to know that their love one has been returned to them and that there is one less POW/ MIA flag flying. We have been able to be part of that closure. Because of the work of Vietnam veterans Laos is where many of our soldiers have been returned from and now North Vietnam is responding as well as Korea, Russia, and other location have be found. These Vigils like ours are so extremely important to that effort.

It is important to keep the pressure on our government. Like it or not we are a country at war. The reality is that with little or no effort our government could do as it has in the past and leave men and women behind. We need to remember for the first time in our history up to 40% of the boots on the ground are female in battle zones. While we do not know what impact we will have by being putting on this annul Vigil we believe that if this event and similar events are not done across the nation we will most certainly see our government do as it has in the past. Personally we all should be very concerned about those men and women that are serving us today. Who

should know better than us how easily our government and our country can forget?

What can you do? Start with the right thing. Take part during the 19th Annual POW/MIA Vigil. Be there for the opening ceremonies at 1800 hrs on Friday night. We have six wonder ladies "Accord" singing, and the founder of Freedom Flight, Dr. Jim Tuorila, Ph.D. will be our speaker. "Big Jim" received the outstanding national VA employee of the year this summer and he will retiring from the St. Cloud V.A. where he has been a Psychologist for over twenty years. He has been a long time friend of NVVA and professionally has worked with a number of our members and friends. The after the final prayer, taps, most go home for the next 24 hours there will be fifteen minute shifts of guard in the Memorial. Come take a shift. Saturday from 4:00 am though mid-day and on to closing the numbers gets thin and this is an NVVA event. This event is not just the few, and that few is getting smaller in ranks every year. God Bless those who come out year after year. Please join us.

This Vigil is not for us it is for those men that have not returned. It is for those going to war right now and in the future those who will put on the uniform and will be putting themselves in harms way just as we once did. We own this much so that some day there is not a Vigil for fellow Americans.

Think about it...See you there...It is the right thing to do!

Appointments not kept at the Clinic and what can we do to help! Durbin M. Keeney

Jeff M. Hall, MSW, Rural Outreach Social Worker asked if we could get your assistance? What he is asking for is "*Requesting your input and thoughts so we can do a better job of reaching this group of veterans.*" *This is an important request as the* Twin Ports Out Patent Clinic (TPOC) is noticing a higher "no show" rate with this group of veterans. If they do show for the initial appointment, many are not showing for ensuing appointments. Here are some of the concerns that veterans have expressed:

<u>Will my unit to find out I'm coming to the VA for care?</u> The VA will not disclose medical information without the veterans consent. The tricky part here is if the unit sends a veteran over on a *line of duty*, and the veteran talks to the VA doctor about other issues than say his/her knee, those records will go back with the line of duty as part of the visit. I have purposefully tried to not access these units other than via the local chain of command. It does appear to shut down referrals if people see me as sanctioned by their major command.

If I am diagnosed with a medical or mental-health problem, it will end my military / civilian career. We are not automatically referring reintegration problems to mental health and then labeling these folks with post-traumatic stress disorder. I try very hard to keep their care with the primary care physician. Our primary purpose at the clinic is treatment. Service-connected issues are referred to their advocates such as the County veteran service officer, power of attorney, etc. We have many staff who served in different combat theaters and understand those issues well. Many of those staff continued to serve. If we identify a veteran with a condition that may harm his/her career; we are encouraging the soldier to consider reclassification to an MOS that would accommodate for that particular injury. We do encourage those soldiers to work with their full-time staff in that regard.

<u>I work during the day and the VA doesn't have evening hours:</u> This is a problem that we are talking about. Previously we did run an evening clinic which was pretty poorly attended. Any staffing to the evening clinic would be drawn from the day shift. I am going out to the units in the field, on the weekends, in the evening, et cetera. I don't want to hear about a soldier going to drill, talking about suicide, on a Monday. Call me @ home if need be.

I am getting bills for my VA Care: Advocates please watch this one closely. There are problems here.

I have noticed a difference in components - WI Guard, MN Guard, Reserve, Army, Navy, etc. Some of the components are extremely centralized and not allowing the unit commanders or first sergeants to make a determination on who can come in and present at a drill, others are very open. This is unfortunate as the VA, has the life long responsibility for these Veterans, and we are losing access to them at a critical time.
